Thanks from Fishin' Michigan

I recently received a letter from John Hesse, the Youth Education Chairperson of Fishin' Michigan, formerly the Mid-Michigan Steelheaders. John wanted to thank the Red Cedar Fly Fishers for their generous contributions to the Bill Earl Youth Fishing Program. In John's words the Youth Fishing Program is "an investment in our youth and in the stewardship of our natural resources that has a huge lasting return." I am proud that the Red Cedars have supported this program as long as

I have been on the board. A total of 181 young people participated in the 2015 program. This was a record number of kids since the program started in 2011. Each child received their own tackle, including a rod and reel, tackle box with basic tackle and a bag of goodies that included extra lures, bobbers (strike indicators to us fly fishers) and educational material.

One parent wrote this comment: "This was a fantastic

event that empowered my son how to fish and spend more time outdoors! The event was extremely well organized and well received! I am telling everyone I know what a valuable program this is!" John ended his letter with this handwritten note: "The Fly Fishers have been great partners! Thanks for your continued support."

Wa Wa Sum

I first heard about Wa Wa Sum about 5 years ago when Dick Augustine was recruiting members of the Red Cedar Fly Fishers to join the local chapter of TU in a late June weekend work and fishing outing. I knew nothing about the lodge so did a little research on it and found out it was owned by MSU and rented out for meetings and educational gatherings. It was built by the wealthy Stranahan and Bell families and was donated to MSU. It is a wonderfully rustic log lodge high on a bluff overlooking a stretch of the Holy Waters of the Au Sable River with a stairway to the river. Although rustic, it has electricity and running water and a small kitchen attached to a large dining room. My favorite room was the long screened in porch with its dozen or so rocking chairs that have a great view of the river. It is located within easy driving of many access point on the main stream as well as the North Branch and South Branch.

I got my first chance to stay at Wa Wa Sum last summer with the TU group and a few Red Cedars. I didn't know what to expect but was looking forward




Salmon in the Classroom Follow Up By: Mark Johnson

Notes from Joe Hemming

.Notes from Joe Hemming's Presentation to the RCFF at WaWa Sum on August 2, 2105 Regarding the Grayling Fish Hatchery Permit.

Dan Vogler of Harrietta Hills Trout Farm, plans to increase production of the Grayling Fish Hatchery, from 20,000 pounds of fish biomass a year to 300,000.

This is a State of Michigan Aquaculture Project and a flow through system

Commercial Fish Farm and not really a hatchery

Applied for and granted a permit via the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality

Objections from the Sierra Club and the Anglers of the Au Sable

Concerns include; type of fish food, fish feces, disease, self-monitoring by owner, flow of fecal matter directly into the river with no filtering or treatment, no monitoring for disease, buildup of excrement on the substrate of the river and no bonding for accidental releases or possible cleanups.

None of the provisions in the Platte River Hatchery discharge permit were included in the Harrietta Hills Trout Farm Permit

Developing Aquaculture in the State of Michigan is the main force behind the project and lack of controls This project has to succeed and the MDA is really pushing this project

Fly fishing brings in more money into the area than this project

All of the normal safeguards in the State Plan for Aquaculture have been ignored for this project

The Anglers of the Au Sable are paying for the monitoring of algae, insects and dissolved oxygen

The Anglers of the Au Sable will bring this issue into court if necessary to protect the river Although not part of Joe's presentation, the following web based information may be helpful:
